

Trail of Stories: How It Went

Wow! When we decided to change the way our summer reading program looked as we adopted Trail of Stories this summer, we weren't sure how people would respond. It turns out, they responded positively! We've had incredible participation this year.

We had around 300 people sign up to participate this year, which is the most we've had in the last five years! So far, we've also had about 50 people turn in their reading logs to enter into a grand prize drawing, and 20 Super Reader tickets have been turned in to get extra grand prize drawing entries. The last day to turn in reading logs or Super Reader tickets is this Friday, August 4th, so if you haven't turned yours in yet, make sure you do! You get a prize just for turning your reading log in. Plus, every Super Reader ticket you turn in increases your chances of winning in the grand prize drawing!

This summer we also had more than 700 people come to library programs. Our biggest programs this year were our Kick-Off Party—where we had games and bubbles to play with, food available for purchase from Smoke'N Joe's BBQ, and a performance by Palamazoo—and the visit from Tipping the Scales—where attendees got to see and interact with a variety of reptiles and amphibians. Both of these programs had more than 100 people attend!

We had a great summer with Trail of Stories, and it is all thanks to wonderful people like you who log their reading and come to our programs. We still have a little time in the program, so if you haven't finished yet, there's still time. If you have finished and can't wait to do more reading programs, don't worry—Winter Reading will be here before you know it!

When a high school student started a private Instagram account that used racist and sexist memes to make his friends laugh, he thought of it as "edgy" humor. Over time, the edge got sharper. Then a few other kids found out about the account, and pretty soon, everyone knew.

Ultimately no one in the small town of Albany, California, was safe from the repercussions of the account's discovery: not the girls targeted by the posts. Not the boy who created the account. Not the group of kids who followed it. Not the adults—educators and parents—whose attempts to fix things too often made them worse. In



the end, no one was laughing, and everyone was left wondering: What does it mean to be held accountable for harm that takes place behind a screen?




