Fennville District Library: Now More Accessible...

Thanks to an incredible grant from the American Library Association, in partnership with the Association for Rural and Small Libraries, the library was recently able to do a massive update to make our physical collection more accessible to people with blindness and/or low vision. This grant for \$10,000 allowed for the purchase of new shelving that not only can house the current large print and audiobook collections but also allows for the continued growth of these collections. Remaining funds after the purchase of the shelving were used to buy new large print books, books on CD, and MP3 players pre-loaded with audiobooks. This project is a huge boon to the library and our community, and it could not have been accomplished without the contributions of the following people: Abi Avery, who wrote the grant application and oversaw the completion of the grant, Aiden, who assisted library staff in assembling the new bookshelves, Betsy and Becky, who spoke with library staff as part of community conversations to help steer this project in the right direction, and all of the library staff who helped with processing new materials, removing and re-shelving books and audiobooks as the new shelving was put together, and even assembling shelves. Thank you all for your incredible work in helping make this project a reality!

...And More Browse-able!

While completing this grant, library staff have been also working on another project to make the collection more accessible, or "browse-able," if you will. This project is genrefication, where all of the adult fiction materials in the library will be categorized by their genre to make it easier for patrons to find the kinds of books they're looking for. The adult fiction collection has been partially genrefied for several years now, with mysteries, westerns, science fiction/fantasy, and Inspirational fiction books all shelved separately from the "fiction" collection. This new project takes that one step farther! The genres that will now be visible on the shelves are:

- General/Literary FictionInspirational Fiction
 - Historical Fiction
- Science Fiction/Fantasy
- MysteryRomance
- ThrillersWesterns
- This process is only just beginning, so please be patient as the library shelves may seem a little chaotic while the project is progress. By the end, though, you should be able to find what you're looking for much easier than you can now!

These inspiring activities connect students with professionals who work and thrive in their careers. They ask questions and see the possibilities for their interests and skills.


