Christopher Banks, President and CEO of the Autism Society of America, puts it like this: "While we will always work to spread awareness, words matter as we strive for autistic individuals to live fully in all areas of life. As many individuals and families affected by autism know, acceptance is often one of the biggest barriers to finding and developing a strong support system." The shift in terminology fosters acceptance to

ignite change through improved support and opportunities in education, employment, accessible housing, affordable health care, and comprehensive long-term services.

THIS BOOK WAS ALMOST 15 YEARS IN THE MAKING. HOW DID IT BEGIN?

The idea popped into my head after my daughter was diagnosed with being on the autism spectrum. Friends told me I could process this by writing an article or book but I was always resistant to it. I didn't want to write a memoir, I didn't want to write a "here's how I dealt with it." I wanted to know about the narrative that I didn't have access to, which was what was going on inside her head. Over the next couple of years, I kept returning to it and it merged into this fantasy story inspired by the content she liked.

WHAT'S THE REACTION BEEN SO FAR?

It's been incredibly heartwarming. One of the things I was very mindful was I know the spectrum is a vast landscape of people with various levels of ability and needs and desires. Hearing from people on the spectrum who have read and it and felt connected to it has been heartening. That's the part that means the world to me.



IEP - An Individualized Education Program (IEP) addresses the needs of a student, from elementary through high school.

TRANSITION PLAN - The transition plan includes evaluations and planning for employment in adulthood. Planning can begin in high school but it may begin earlier in some cases.

COUNSELING - Teens can have individual counseling in school or with help from their case managers. Counseling can focus on specific areas, including behavior, socialization, communication, and organizational skills.

VOCATIONAL - Teens can receive vocational training so they can continue their education or enter the workforce after high school.

THERAPY - A teen may continue to have therapy, including occupational and speech therapy.

HABILITATION - Teens with low-functioning autism can receive habilitation services that focus on self help skills through local service organizations.

SUPPORT GROUPS - The Asperger Syndrome and High Functioning Autism Association has a monthly support group for people ages 13 to 19 years.

Autism is usually portrayed as a checklist of deficits, including difficulties interacting socially, problems in communicating, sensory challenges, and repetitive behavior patterns. This perspective leads to therapies focused on ridding individuals of autistic symptoms. In *Uniquely Human*, Dr. Barry M. Prizant suggests a major shift in

understanding autism: Instead of classifying "autistic" behaviors as

signs of pathology, he sees them as strategies to cope with a world that feels chaotic and overwhelming. Rather than curb these behaviors, it's better to enhance abilities, build on strengths, and offer supports that will naturally lead to more desirable behavior and a better quality of life.

Dr. Temple Grandin was born in Boston, Massachusetts. Temple's achievements are remarkable because she was a child with autism. At age two, she had speech delays as well as other signs of severe autism. Many hours of speech therapy and intensive training enabled Temple ultimately to speak. As a teenager, life was hard with constant teasing. Mentoring by her high school science teacher and her aunt on her ranch in Arizona motivated Temple to study and pursue a career as a scientist and livestock equipment designer. She is a popular international lecturer on autism, a professor of animal science at Colorado State University, and the author of Emergence: Labeled Autistic; Thinking in Pictures: Other Reports from My Life with Autism; Animals in Translation; Unwritten Rules of Social Relationships; The Way I See It; The Autistic Brain: Thinking Across the Spectrum; DIFFERENT...Not

Less; and many more.

From non-verbal to public speaker and college professor, Temple Grandin has written many books guiding and inspiring individuals on their own autism journey.
