

### What it means to be a "Friend"



security. But when the dead bodies of young women start appearing outside of town, a darkness descends that she can't resist confronting. Side by side with her friend Jean, and inspired by her reading, especially by Edgar Allan Poe's detective Dupin, Eliza pieces together an array of clues to try to catch the killer, all the while juggling clients who begin to seem more and more suspicious.

Eliza and Jean are determined not just to survive, but to find their way in a lawless town on the fringes of the Wild West—a bewitching combination of beauty and danger—as what will become the Civil War looms on the horizon. As Mrs. Parks says, "Everyone knows that this is a dangerous business, but between you and me, being a woman is a dangerous business, and don't let anyone tell you otherwise …"

Even Though I Knew the End is a novella that brings together a nicely developed noir'esque, good versus evil fantasy, wrapped with mystery and romance.

Within the first few pages, I was immediately drawn in by the use of enchantments to engage with a crime scene in a setting that is a nod to the 1930-40's era that included damsels in distress looking to hire cynical detectives. Think The Maltese Falcon by Dashinell Hammett, and the movie of the same title-the Humphrey Bogart version, of course (which, by the way, is in my top 10 movies of all time).

This book played out in my mind like that aforementioned black-andwhite move. I imagined the characters with their hats pulled down, and trench coats pulled up as they walked the cold, lamp-lit streets of Chicago as the train rumbled above. Yet unlike the movie, C. L. Polk gives us a supernatural person lurking in the shadows of a dark alley ready to offer you the twist you thought you knew was coming.

from Nantucket on a routine voyage for whales. Fifteen months later, in the farthest reaches of the South Pacific, it was repeatedly rammed and sunk by an eighty-ton bull sperm whale. Its twenty-man crew, fearing cannibals on the islands to the west, made for the 3,000-mile-distant coast of South America in three tiny boats. During ninety days at sea under horrendous conditions, the survivors clung to life as one by one, they succumbed to hunger, thirst, disease, and fear.

Philbrick interweaves his account of this extraordinary ordeal of ordinary men with a wealth of whale lore and with a brilliantly detailed portrait of the lost, unique community of Nantucket whalers. Impeccably researched and beautifully told, the book delivers the ultimate portrait of man against nature, drawing on a remarkable range of archival and modern sources, including a longlost account by the ship's cabin boy.


