

On October 13th, 2021 the Michigan Library Association held its annual awards ceremony. Among the 12 awards presented that evening was Public Librarian of the Year. According to the MLA nomination criteria, "The Public Librarian of the Year Award recognizes outstanding library professionals that inspire people, provide innovative library service to their community, promote collaboration among libraries, and show evidence of personal and professional achievement as well as initiative and creativity."

The Fennville District Library found these standards met, above and beyond, in their Director, Teresa Kline. Teresa came to the library in December of 2013, and since then she has taken the lead in many collaborative endeavors in our community. One of her most recognized achievements was writing and receiving a 3-year grant from the Institute of Museum and Library Services, providing us with the resources to work with the Telamon Migrant Head Start Center in Pullman on a pilot program establishing literary services to our migrant population. Pullman Telamon Center Director, Cherie Smalley, states, "Teresa has worked at the Fennyille District Library for eight years, and it amazes me how compassionate she continues to be when it comes to literacy and the communities that she serves."

Most businesses have taken a financial hit since 2020 as a result of the COVID pandemic, and libraries are no exception. Because of this, Teresa submitted a grant to the American Library Association COVID Relief Fund. The Fennville District Library was one of 34 libraries to be awarded

this grant, and the only one in Michigan. With this grant the library has added more hotspots, improved technology, and is building a core collection of Spanish materials. Not only did this help offset the financial stress caused by the pandemic, but it also demonstrated Teresa's dedication to providing literacy programs, materials and technology to our rural community.

The library staff, board of directors, and patrons are very proud of the multiple improvements that Teresa has made for the library and community. Being named MLA Public Librarian of the Year is a well-deserved honor.

Most of you know me as a librarian, but what you may not know about me is that my education is in the arts. As a graduate with a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree I have spent countless hours studying the history of art.

Many artists, past and present, have my admiration, but I consistently find myself drawn to the Italian painter Artemisia Gentileschi. As a girl she experienced the loss of her mother at a young age, lived under the heavy hand of her father as a protege while wielding the superior talent, survived sexual assault and the humiliation of a public trial, and became a single mother after the loss of 4 of her 5 children. Gentileschi was a woman driven beyond the heartbreak of a tragic life, determined to make her mark, and a living, as a painter in a time when women were not allowed such opportunities.

With these three books you get different styles of writing that bring Gentileschi's passion for painting to life. A historical fiction novel, graphic novel and a novel in verse. No matter what format you prefer, each one will give you a glimpse into the life of a strong, heroic woman who brilliantly rose out of a sea of male painters recognized as the great masters of the 17th Century Renaissance, and landed herself a permanent place of importance in the history of art and women alike.

A descendent of storytellers and "one of our finest-and most complicated—poets" (Los Angeles Review of Books), Joy Harjo continues her legacy with this latest powerful collection.
